



**Advancing Women’s Right of Access to Information (AWRTI) Bangladesh
Request for Applications**

Subject Line: Priority Area – 1 or Priority Area – 2

Terms of Reference

1. Context

The Carter Center (TCC) partners with governments, civil society, and international and regional bodies to enhance governance and transform lives through a meaningful right of access to information and justice for women. Women in Bangladesh face disproportionate challenges in exercising the fundamental right of access to information, which hinders economic empowerment and the promotion and protection of other human rights. Although the Right to Information (RTI) Act went into effect in 2009, the benefits of meaningful access to information for women have not fully been realized.

To address these challenges, the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) awarded funding to The Carter Center in 2023 to support the Advancing Women’s Right of Access to Information (AWRTI) in Bangladesh Activity (the Project) in target districts. Under this project, the Center is working to implement three mutually reinforcing objectives, with a focus on assisting the most marginalized women:

- A strengthened legal and policy environment has enabled more sustainable access to information for women
- National and target local government have more effectively and equitably provided information to women in target districts, and
- Through civil society organizations, information liaisons, and youth in target districts, women advance their use of the right of access to information

Effective implementation of the RTI Act and other principles guaranteeing the right to information and transparency requires not only the adoption of sound policies but also a deep understanding of the social and institutional dynamics that influence behavior change. AWRTI will support critical research to identify policy gaps and implementation challenges, offering comparative insights and best practices to drive informed decision-making. This approach will facilitate a more responsive and transparent governance system, ultimately leading to improved access to information for women, particularly those from marginalized communities.

AWRTI is also keenly aware that recent political developments are likely to have a profound impact not only on the RTI landscape, but related issues of transparency, accountability, and citizen participation more broadly. The project is particularly interested in research efforts that incorporate

this perspective of political and cultural change, what it may mean for RTI and related issues – especially their impact on women – and how advocacy efforts may be tailored to maximize the opportunities presented by this transitional context.

Given Bangladesh’s large pool of skilled academics and researchers, there should be a steady supply of policy briefs to inform the government and lead to evidence-based policies in the RTI landscape. AWRTI seeks to build connections with research institutions and other organizations in Bangladesh to produce original research to inform future policy interventions in the RTI and transparency area and document the impact of greater RTI and citizen influence. AWRTI also seeks to support research that identifies where and how open, transparent, and accountable governance efforts can have the greatest impact on women’s lives.

2. Objective

The objective of the research is to identify issues and develop strategies to improve the legal and policy environment for increased transparency and access to information for women and other marginalized communities. It specifically seeks:

- i. To conduct social and behavior change research that can identify gaps and strategies that can improve access to information, particularly for women and marginalized groups.
- ii. To identify the factors contributing to the current state of the RTI and transparency landscape and prioritize research areas where open, transparent, and accountable governance efforts can have the biggest impact in terms of service and needs of women and marginalized groups.
- iii. To identify the potential challenges and benefits of digital ID systems, which run the risk of further excluding people if these systems are not carefully designed and deployed.
- iv. To produce white papers for national and local governments on key RTI issues, data protection regulations, e-governance readiness assessments, and analysis to identify areas for potential future action, such as potential amendments to the RTI Act.
- v. Present the findings of the research, studies, and analyses in a manner that sets forth clear strategies that policymakers, government actors, civil society, working groups, academia, and the international cooperation community can pursue to improve the enabling environment for RTI and transparency such that the lives of women and marginalized communities are improved.
- vi. To develop easy-to-use bespoke briefs for the Cabinet Division to inform the adoption of evidence-based policies, including assessment to improve any RTI-related strategic plans.

3. Scope of Work

Under the scope of services, this research proposal invites local, established research and academic institutions to develop evidence-based, problem-solving approaches that encourage public dialogue to strengthen transparency, accountability, and citizen participation. This will be accomplished through social and behavioral research, utilizing both quantitative and qualitative methods, to identify gaps and formulate strategies that enhance access to information and

transparency, with a particular focus on women and other marginalized communities. Furthermore, the research should recommend new strategies for advancing RTI, identify potential stakeholders, and explore emerging themes that align with the evolving governance landscape.

These research findings will be shared with the government and other relevant stakeholders through policy briefs and other appropriate formats, to inform the adoption of evidence-based policies and enhance RTI-related strategic plans.

AWRTI plans to award two research proposals, allowing for complementary, parallel research efforts. The following are areas of research priority (Table 1) for this assignment and are meant to serve as illustrative examples of potential topics for research. Applicants are encouraged to propose research that aligns these priority areas with the objectives of this initiative. Qualified research institutions or organizations need to submit separate proposals, if interested in both priority areas, each specifying the relevant priority area.

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4. Methodology and Data Collection Plan

The organization selected for the research study will propose a methodology that may require refinement during the research development process. The organization’s technical proposal should outline a detailed design of the research methods, including, for example, data sampling and collection instrument, plan and strategy, including pre-testing methodology, data quality control, and analysis timeline, assessment report finalization, and the overall execution plan in consultation with the AWRTI team.

5. Research Area (Geographical):

Research proposal/s must prioritize giving specific focus to the following districts: Moulvibazar, Sylhet, Satkhira, Khulna, Rajshahi, Naogaon, Khagrachari, Rangamati, Netrakona, Dinajpur, and Dhaka District.

6. Research Duration:

The Research and associated deliverables should be completed within five (5) months of signing the award.

7. Reporting:

The selected applicants will work under the technical direction of the Chief of Party and coordinate administratively and submit deliverables to the Carter Center’s MEL Director.

8. Qualifications:

- The applicant can be a local university/institution, research organization, or think tank.
- 5 years of demonstrated experience in conducting any project evaluation/assessment & policy research.
- At least 3 years’ experience in, conducting multi-stakeholder consultations – leading large surveys for USAID, FCDO, UN or other donor-funded projects and writing technical reports, conducting both qualitative and quantitative research with a strong understanding of research design and statistical analysis tools and methods.
- Experience working with electronic-based data capture, monitoring, and evaluation tools.
- Strong financial capability to carry out the assignment in a financially sound and transparent manner, to include regular expenditure reporting
- Valid Trade License, TIN, and VAT Certificates, if applicable.
- Staff availability of assignment-related professional skills and necessary logistics (e.g., vehicles, office equipment, etc.).
- Experience of coordinating with stakeholders from government, private sector, academia/ research, and development agencies.
- Demonstrated ability to work in teams and deliver tasks within set deadlines.

9. Team Composition

The organization is expected to propose a qualified research team with demonstrated expertise in conducting assessments in governance and development sectors. The team should possess strong analytical skills for compiling reports and presenting findings clearly and accessible. **It is strongly encouraged that women researchers be included in the leadership and/or membership of proposed teams.**

The organization may include a team leader and relevant subject matter experts, statisticians/analysts, data collection supervisor/s, and enumerators who speak the local dialect and understand the nuances in the target districts where AWRTI is implemented. The proposal should provide details about the number of researchers that will be deployed to various data collection sites. The subject matter experts must have a profound understanding of the Bangladeshi context. All team members will have extensive experience in conducting studies of similar complexity, size, and value of the assignment.

The team leader must have a strong research background in good governance, policy research, and experience in preparing policy briefs & report writing. Good understanding of the local institutional landscape & experience in coordinating with key stakeholders from the government, private sector, academia/ research, NGOs, CSO, and development agencies.

9.1 Team Members' Qualification:

The suggested composition of the team includes the following positions. The preferred qualification of key experts will be:

- Team leader: Master's/Ph.D. with a social science degree from a recognized university with a relevant background; ideally will have 8+ years of experience (preferably previous work on a USAID-funded project and solid understanding of international donor data requirements).
- Subject Matter Experts: Master's/Ph.D. from relevant fields with 5+ years of relevant experience and explicit knowledge about the respective sectors.
- Data Management Expert: Graduation with a degree related to data management; 3+ years of experience in analyzing large volume of data; should have a solid understanding of international donor data quality compliance standards.

A list of key professionals, along with their profiles, who will be involved in completing this assigned task should be submitted with the proposal.

10. Deliverables, Schedule and Payment:

The selected organization shall adhere to the following deliverables and schedule. Payment will be issued upon successful completion of the specified deliverables and after receiving the necessary approvals from the Project/TCC.

All the deliverables shall be submitted in English. The policy brief/white paper, final report, and presentation shall be submitted in both English and Bangla.

11. Selection Criteria:

The organization(s) will be selected based on the evaluation of technical and economic proposals, each scored out of a maximum of 100 points. The total score for each application will be calculated with the technical proposal accounting for 80% and the economic proposal for 20% of the overall score.

AWRTI reserves the right to reject or disqualify any proposal at its sole discretion and without obligation to provide an explanation.

11.2 Financial Evaluation Criteria

For technically qualified bidders, proposals with more competitive pricing, while realistically anticipating and justifying costs, will receive higher scores for the financial component. Proposals with higher financial estimates will receive proportionally reduced scores, in line with the 20% weighting allocated to financial evaluation.

The final score for each proposal will be the combined result of both technical and financial evaluations, converted to a scale of 100.

1. Proposed methodology and technical approach.
2. Economic proposal (budget).
3. Two written samples from prior research conducted on topics relevant to the illustrative focus areas outlined above.
4. CVs of proposed research team members.
5. Demonstrated capacity to conduct sound research on topics relevant to access to information, including three references as mentioned above
